mosque which covers the cave. A man who went with us took us as far as that was as near as Christ ever allowed to go. I have seen some very filthy places, especially in Egypt and some parts of the East, but for the utter depths of defilement, there is nothing on the face of the earth to compare with Hebron. The appearances they have no closets or outhouses except the narrow alley and it was necessary to look out and place your feet every time you stepped from stepping into unclean filth.

It makes one fairly shudder to think how degraded, uncivilized sentiments to humanity are holding position on such historic ground, made sacred to Christians by so much Bible history. Joshua destroyed the city of Jericho (Joshua 6, 36-37), and a few years later Caleb for an inheritance (Joshua 13-14). After David was king of Israel he dwelt in Hebron for seven years and a half before he went to Jerusalem (2d Samuel, 5, 5). It was in Hebron that Joab assassinated King Achish (2d Samuel, 3, 27) and David ordered the murderers of King Heli to be put to death. (2d Samuel, 4, 12). Here also Absalom had his headquarters when he conspired against his father, David. (2d Samuel, 15, 7-10).

As there is so much to interest the student of the Bible in and around Hebron, though more than a dozen of the best of the prophets were preachers of God's word there deeply interested in it pertains to sacred history, everyone of the party expressed themselves as having no desire to leave the place again until the Sultan was removed from Hebron and a great change had taken place in the city and the eighty-two thousand people who lived there.

Our intention on the return to Jerusalem to stop at Bethlehem, the poor, little ponies which were in the carriages, weak and worn from work and abuse from their heartless, Arab drivers, were so tired that we returned to Jerusalem, reaching there at midnight and reserving Bethlehem for the day.

Their first winter—1804-5—was spent among the Mandan Indians; the winter of 1805-6 they passed near the mouth of the Columbia river among the Clatsop Indians. They crossed the Rocky Mountains at five different places, and traveled sometimes in canoes, sometimes on horseback, sometimes afoot, and covered about 10,000 miles in all.

Their adventures proved truth to be as strange as fiction; their discoveries were of the greatest importance.
