It is nearly 100 years since they started on that great exploration fathered by Thomas Jefferson, up the Missouri and down the Columbia rivers, crossing the mountains between, and the results of it and the deep interest in it still lives.

Their first wint :r-1804-5-was spent among the Mandan Indians; the winter of 1805-6 they passed near the mouth of the Columbia river among the Clatsop Indians. They crossed the Rocky Mountains at five different places, and traveled sometimes in canoes, sometimes on horseback, sometimes afoot, and covered about 10,000 miles in all.

Their adventures proved truth to be as strange as fiction; their discoveries were of the greatest importance.
