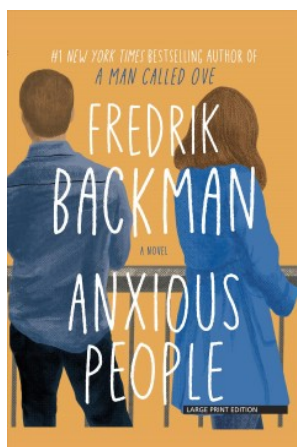

by Sarah Haywood

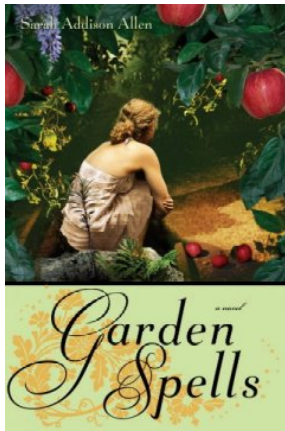

by Fredrik Backman

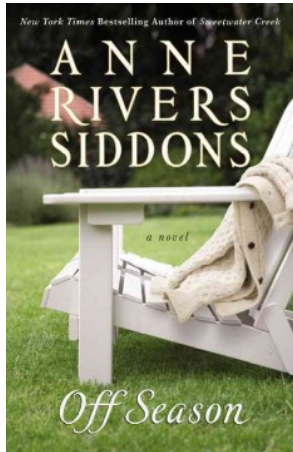

by Anne Rivers Siddons

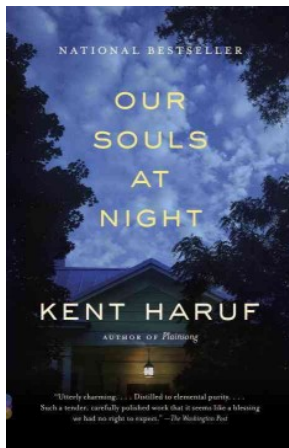

by Charlotte Wood

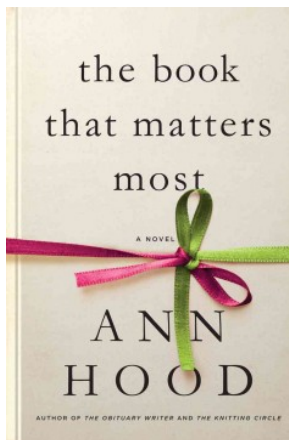

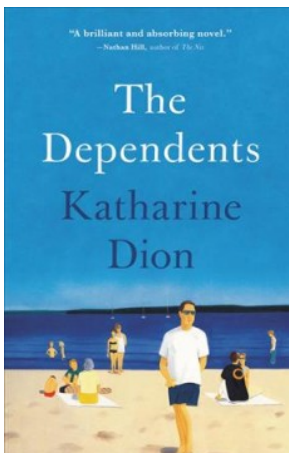

by Ann Hood

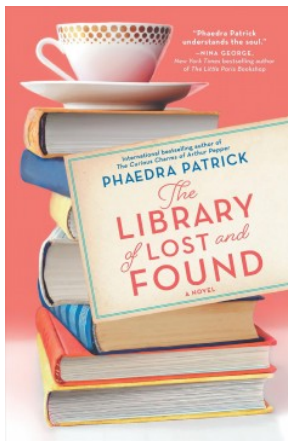

by Katharine Dion

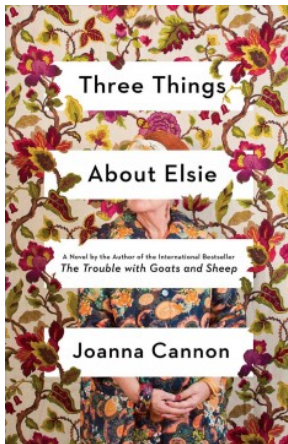

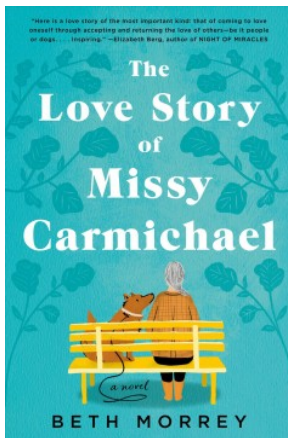

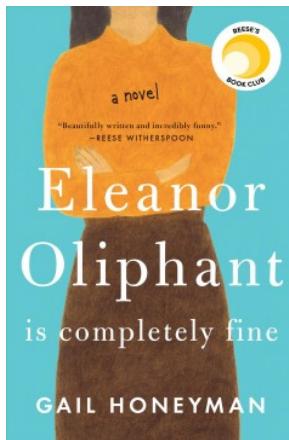
The story of an injured woman who meditates on her complicated relationship with a best friend when a man they believed was dead joins her retirement community

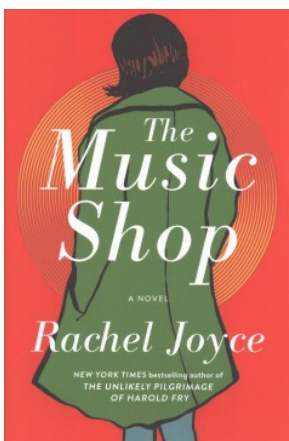

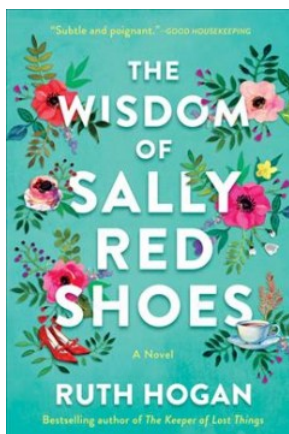


The Music Shop

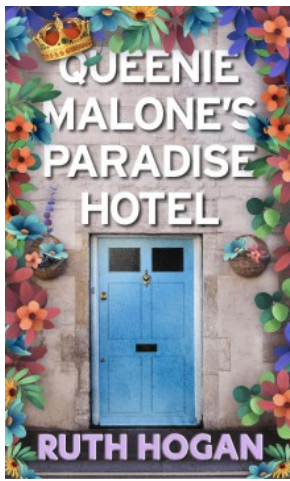
