◆ BACK TO SCHOOL

As you get ready for the new school year, don't forget to include the Library. It offers several services specifically for teachers that can help you and your students have a successful year.

- ◆ Don't worry about due dates or late fees! A teacher can check out books for school use with a 28 day extension of the regular due date with no fines or late fees. If you teach in Community Unit School District 300 but live in another library district, you may check books out with the extended due date provided you have a card from your home library.
- ◆ If you need your students to research a particular topic, call in an *Assignment Alert*. The Library will put books on a particular subject on reserve to ensure the materials are available for all students to use.
- ◆ Need a few books on a certain topic or by a particular author? Give the Library a call. They will set books aside for a teacher to pick up.

- ◆ Look for The Library Link, a newsletter just for teachers, at your school. It is sent quarterly to all elementary and middle school teachers in District 300. If your school does not receive The Library Link, please call the Library at ext. 210.
- ◆ Don't forget that your class can visit the Library for a tour, a book talk, card catalog instruction, help with research, and anything else you and your class need. Give the Library a call to set up time for a visit.
- ◆ Look for the Library's new "*Bookworm on Wheels*" in your neighborhood or at your school. It is a fully equipped outreach van ready and waiting to visit.

As you can see, your Library has a lot to offer! As you plan your year, think how the Library can help you and your students.

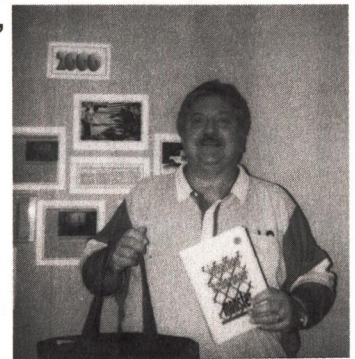

WOMEN OF DUNDEE

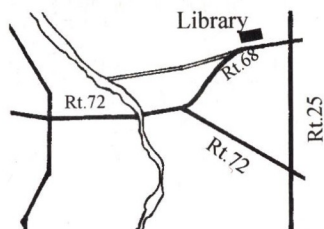
The stories of the women who came west to the Dundee Area into a wilderness and an uncertain future. Local history comes to life as **Marge Edwards** portrays these courageous women.
