In the 1970s libraries were able to search indexes on-line.

There are an estimated 117,418 libraries of all types in the United States today.

Throughout the United States there are 130,102 public library employees,
including librarians and other staff.

Each year more than 4,500 students receive a master's degree in library and information
studies, the accepted professional degree for librarians.

In a national survey 91% believe libraries are changing,
and libraries are dynamic places with a variety of activities for families.
