DTPLD Welcomes New Director

The Dundee Township Public Library District's Board of Trustees appointed Elisa F. Topper Library Director at the October board meeting. Topper began her directorship November 17, 2003. She is the successor of the late director, Sylvia Murphy Williams.

For the past five years she served as the Assistant Dean of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science at Dominican University, formerly Rosary College, in River Forest. She has extensive professional experience including Business Reference Librarian, Special Librarian for a career counseling social service agency, Director of Training for the Chicago Public Library, and Director of Member Services for the Association of College and Research Libraries, the largest division of the American Library Association (ALA). She also is an active member of professional library associations.

In 2003, Elisa Topper was named one of the top "50 Movers and Shakers" in her profession by *Library Journal*. Each month she addresses workplace and career issues in the "Working Knowledge" column featured in the American Library Association's publication *American Libraries*, which is the official publication of the American Library Association and is received by 65,000 librarians in the United States and Canada.

She looks forward to getting to know the community and enhancing library resources.

A public reception and open house is being planned for Friday, January 16, 2004.

I first became acquainted with the Dundee Township Public Library District while working on various Illinois Library Association (ILA) committees with the late director, Sylvia Murphy Williams, a personal friend and colleague, never knowing what the future would hold. 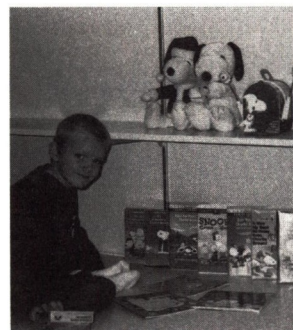
NOTICE FOR PARENTS

This upgrade will provide more of a natural light and will save the library 31 kilowatt hours of energy per year. The Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation was established to provide lighting grant funding to libraries, park districts, and schools.
