Meet the Circulation Staff

The Circulation Staff can assist you with many of your needs. They can help you obtain a new library card or renew one, check in and check out materials, get change, buy floppy discs, pay fines, and register to vote. There are 15

employees in the department, 7 Pages (book shelveers) and 8 Circulation Clerks. According to Cheryl Sarto, Head of Circulation, below are the most common questions asked of the staff.

How do I get a library card?

Present two forms of identification with a current address (current driver's license or I.D., checkbook, or utility bill). Mail must be addressed to you and be postmarked within 30 days. If you lost your card the process is the same except a \$1 fee is charged. Lost cards must be reported immediately as patrons are responsible for all materials borrowed on their card.

Do I need my card to check out or use the computer?

Yes. To reserve a computer bring your library card. You will need to purchase a VEND card if you wish to print. The VEND machine is now located next to the internet stations. Library staff are able to assist you.

What are your hours?

Monday-Thursday 9 a.m.-9 p.m.; Friday-Saturday 9 a.m.-5:30 p.m. Sunday 1 p.m.-4 p.m. (during school year)

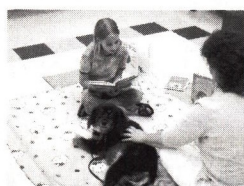
Do I need to come in to renew?

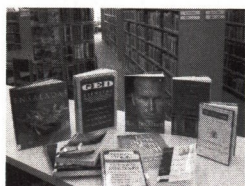

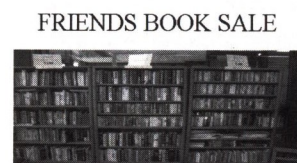
This spring a second book drop was installed at the Jewel-Osco in West Dundee.

Making Bullies Disappear (school-age)

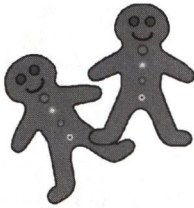

Jacqueline Kennedy: The Esthetics of Style

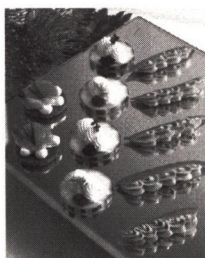
