Notes from the Director

The board, staff and I are working to improve the library and its services for our community.

Recently, we placed a suggestion box on our circulation desk to solicit feedback from our patrons. We welcome your input, and I am pleased to inform you that we have implemented many of the ideas you have suggested. Just a few of the items you asked for included installing wireless internet, circulating canvas book bags, adding new books to the collection, improving the DVD and video collections, and listing renewal dates on all new library cards.

We have also installed new copiers for public use, had our first AARP Driver Safety Program, replaced the library banners on the outside of the building, and made the first two deliveries for our Home Word Bound library service. Upcoming improvements include the bathroom remodeling project, email notification for reserves, plans for additional outreach services and applications for additional grants. The Spanish books purchased at the Guadalajara Book Fair are being added to the collection. The Friends of the Library just conducted their book sale and are raising funds for a teen area. The membership drive for new friends is ongoing so please consider joining this energetic group!






Read to a Dog



Summertime and the Readin' is Easy


Last year's theme is back by popular demand. The reading program for teens allows you to choose your summer reading style. Whether you are beach bound or college bound, grab a book and have some fun.
