Notes from the Director

Can you imagine waking up one morning and discovering that your local library was not there? This is what New Orleans and the neighboring communities are experiencing as a result of Hurricane Katrina. I watched and read of the devastation as we all did, but this past month I got to view the city and one of the libraries in person.

The American Library Association kept their commitment to hold the annual conference there in June. Many of us were ambivalent about going to New Orleans, including me, but because I was speaking at the conference I knew that I could not back out. What amazed all of us was the fact that everywhere we went (17,000 in attendance) we were thanked by the residents.

The media covered ALA's commitment to the city, highlighting the positive impact made by the influx of 20 million dollars in revenue. Since then other major groups have signed on and donors are sending monies to rebuild the public and school libraries. Over 900 conference attendees donated a day of the conference to help to rebuild libraries in the city.

In thirty years of being a librarian I have never been prouder to have been part of the association. I heard speeches by Madeleine Albright, First Lady Laura Bush and Anderson Cooper.

I also took a neighborhoods tour and attended a reception given by the Jefferson Township Parish, where our Friends of the Library group donated funds from their book sales. They are rebuilding their libraries but progress will be slow. It broke my heart to see what they are going through.

I am thankful that we have our community library where we still can continue to make improvements.

A New Look for Our Library Card

The next time you visit us, take time to view the lovely painting of the Dundee Public Library that hangs near the elevator on the first floor.

It is an original watercolor created by Algonquin artist Sue Clark that has now become the signature image on our new library card.

Clark, who received her degree in fine arts from Northern Illinois University, had worked at the Dundee Library from 1995 to 2001 before leaving to pursue her art on a full-time basis.



In 2005, she was commissioned to paint the library by Elisa Topper, director.

The artist was very excited about the project because

"libraries have been important to me since I was a kid," she recalled, adding that since third grade, she spent almost every Saturday at her local branch library.

Clark (in above photo, left) was among the first recipients of the new card presented to her by Jeanne Etling, head of the circulation department. The card is being issued to new and renewing patrons.

"Eventually, it will be carried by more than 36,000 of our patrons," Etling said. As an added convenience, it also comes with a key chain version.

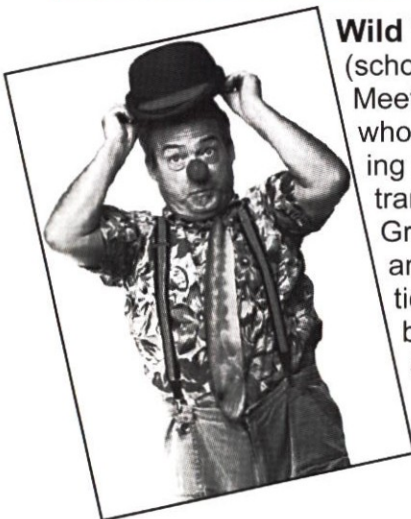

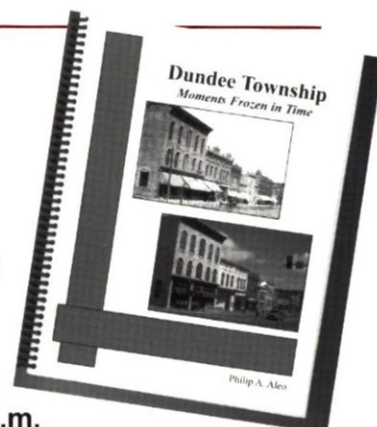

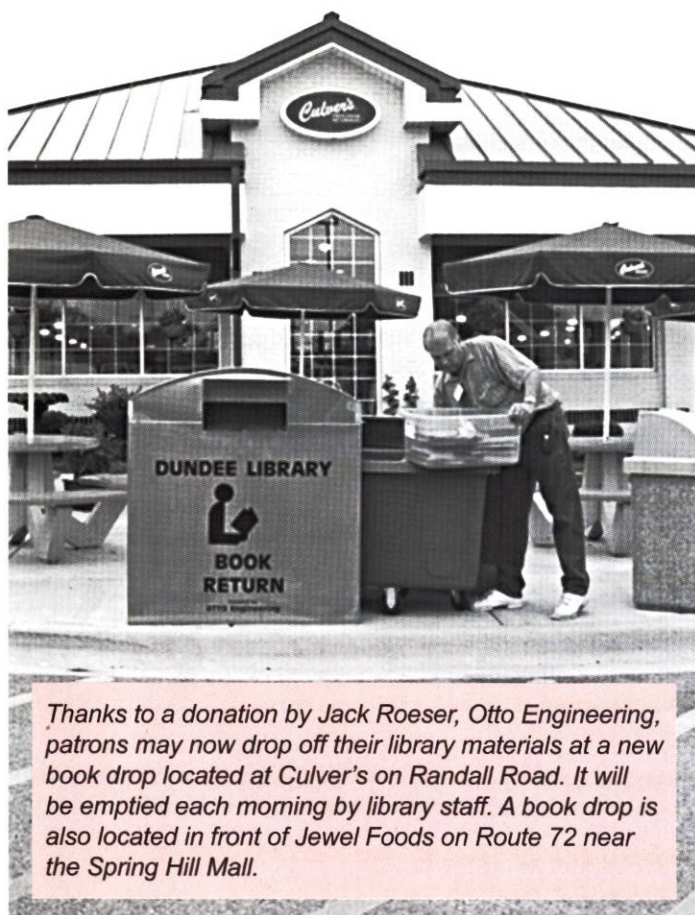
