DUNDEE LIBRARY GOES OUT AND ABOUT

It's been a season of coming and going as library staff have taken the message of books and reading into this community and beyond. Here's a sampling of recent excursions:

To School: The library was on hand at open houses at Meadowdale and Golfview schools to register patrons and explain services. Also, members of the children's department have been visiting preschools in the area.

To the Elgin Inn: The Dundee Library manned a booth at the "Quilt of Learning," a two-day workshop/exhibit for educators and community agencies.

To Springfield: A member of the adult services department traveled to the Illinois State Library to attend a program on family literacy.

To Crystal Lake: A Saturday morning Toastmasters Club heard a presentation on library resources for writers and speakers.

To Church: Representatives from circulation and reference elaborated on library services as guests of a ladies' group at First Congregational Church in Dundee.

To Huntley Square: Library director Paul Mechtenberg attends meetings of the Cardinal Chamber of Commerce and supplies titles of business books for their newsletter.

To Other Libraries: New librarian at Dundee-Crown High School Doug Williamson has invited Dundee Library staff to regular meetings in an effort to enhance student services at the two facilities.

TAKEN FOR GRANTED

The Dundee Library is proud to be a partner in two recently-acquired grants:

PALS is the acronym for School District 300's family literacy effort, for which it received \$30,000 from the Illinois secretary of state's office.

This Plan for Adults, Library and School promotes literacy by involving both parents and children.

Besides the library, partners include Meadowdale School, Elgin Community College, and Literacy Volunteers of America.

Although receiving no funds, the library is assisting literacy efforts by offering special orientation for families.

Golfview School is using its \$11,000 Urban Education Partnership grant to join with other agencies in helping students succeed in school.

In addition to the school and the library, partners are the Dundee Township Park District, Judson College, and Elgin Community College.

The Dundee Library's participation in this Illinois Board of Higher Education grant involves serving children who ride a shuttle bus to the library.

The Friends of the Dundee Library announces two special events: both money-related!

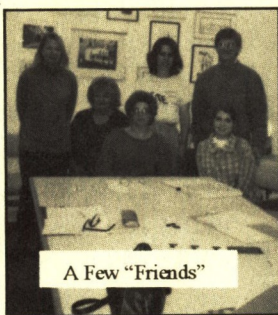
A silent auction is in progress on the library's main floor. Stop in to view a selection of donated new books. Many are just perfect for holiday gift-giving.

HOLES IN BOARD

Illinois libraries have long received outstanding support from the people. Illinois had the first general library law that provided a fixed and separate tax rate for libraries.

There are more than six hundred public libraries governed by local boards involving almost five thousand trustees.

On April 8, 1995, three library trustees will be elected to join incumbent trustees at the Dundee Township Library.

Now is the time to pick up nominating papers from the library. They will need to be completed and returned starting January 16, 1995.

To qualify as a Library Trustee, you must be a resident of voting age. Trustees serve for four years without compensation.

Library Trustees are expected to attend regular monthly meetings, plus any special or committee meetings that may be called.

They should know the community, have an interest in the library and in promoting its services, be willing to work with six other people, and participate in discussions.

Most important, candidates should find satisfaction in serving the community and the public library.

This is a great opportunity to make a contribution. Come to the library to pick up your nominating papers today.

Just-arrived **videos** are: *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever*, *The Frugal Gourmet: Colonial Christmas with Friends*, and *Messiah*.

For children: **Addy's Surprise- A Christmas Story** by Connie Porter. Meet the newest character in the American Girls Collection. In **The Friendly Beast- A Traditional Christmas Carol** illustrated by Sarah Chamberlain, the stable beasts relate the gifts they brought to the newborn Jesus. Tapes include Dickens' **A Christmas Carol**, with music from the 1991 stage production; and **The Season** by Fred Penner.

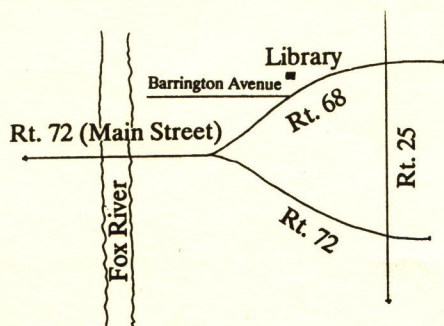
