Long-Range Planning Committee, Jane Nollman, Chair

Every successful organization is driven by a definitive long-range plan, and the Dundee Township Public Library District is no exception. In April, 1997 the long-range planning committee of the Board began the process of establishing a strategic plan. The Board scheduled a long-range planning workshop for January, 1998 and immediately began compiling information to direct and support the direction of the plan.

Our initial efforts were to determine the needs and desires of the community. Questionnaires were distributed to patrons at the Library. Results of those questionnaires, as well as a previous survey conducted in 1996, were compiled. In addition, over 100 invitations were sent to community organizations and individuals to participate in focus groups. Four groups were held in December, conducted by an independent consultant.

Critical to the success of the Library is staff with a clear perception of the goals of the Library and their role in making those goals a reality. Staff spent a portion of their fall inservice workshop brainstorming about the current status of the Library and the community, projections for the future and what they'd like to see as the direction of the Library. Current statistics of Library use and demographic studies were also compiled.

Looking to the future triggered the Board to review the Library's past - and what a wonderful and "moving" past it's been. The Library has been in 7 different locations throughout its history. Bits and pieces of the Library history existed in a variety of places and was cleverly and touchingly brought together in one document by Dundee-Crown High School student,

Thomas Amenta. Thomas tackled this project with enthusiasm and dedication which resonates in his "History of the Dundee Township Public Library District" available for your education and enjoyment in the Library.

Armed with all of this input, the Board met in late January for an all day workshop to establish initial long-range goals. In the process the mission statement was reviewed and revised slightly.

The following is the revised mission statement and preliminary long-range plan.

Mission Statement:

The mission of the Dundee Township Public Library District is to provide an environment which assists and encourages our diverse community in learning, reading, and entertainment by providing the services, programs, materials, and information for use in remembering our past, living in the present, and striving for the future.

Long-Range Plan:

1. Economically and expeditiously increase the number of parking spaces.
2. Provide library services to all segments of the community through partnering.
3. Investigate sources of revenue not dependent on tax dollars.
4. Provide staff inservice to enhance service delivery.

As a next step, task forces have been established to develop detailed plans to accomplish these goals. We're enthusiastic about what we've accomplished and the opportunities it presents to the future of the Library.

ADULT FICTION




ADULT NON-FICTION




NEW BOOKS






