

New shelving for the Library's audio materials have given a refreshing and updated look to the A/V Department. Nearly half the shelving is devoted to the popular books on tape collection. The Library has both abridged and unabridged versions of classics, non-fiction and best sellers on tape. The remainder of the new shelving holds our CD and audio tape collection, language materials and LP's. New items are featured separately and everything is easier to browse.



Another new area in the center of the Library holds the Prize Picks books for one week check-out. Theme book displays, such as mysteries or medical thrillers, will be featured here along with our Readers' Advisory reference materials. Finding a new author or series to read is even easier using the *Novelist* CD-ROM. You can enter the title of a book you liked and use subject headings to find other similar books, or search by genre to find horror, romance or mystery titles.

ADULT SUMMER READING PROGRAM

The theme of this year's Adult Summer Reading Program is "Listen up!" Many of our Library patrons are already acquainted with our large selection of books on tape and enjoy listening to them. By completing just one Book Log of **four** adult library books including **one** on audio tape, abridged or unabridged, patrons qualify to enter the drawing for one of four Grand Prizes. An unlimited number of completed Book Logs can be submitted for the drawing. The Grand Prize package includes a personal stereo cassette player with headphones, batteries and a gift certificate to a local bookstore, all in a "So Many Books, So Little Time" tote bag.

Tickets to Ravinia concerts, pens and bookmarks will also be given away as patrons turn in their Book Logs. Last year 115 patrons participated in the program and read a total of 552 books.

For additional information and to register for the program, stop at the Reference Desk and present your Dundee Township Library card. Book Logs can be picked up beginning Monday, June 8 and must be completed and turned in by Saturday, August 15.




