❖ from the library board

While I was standing in line at the checkout of a local grocery store, one of our "usual" weekly shoppers made the comment that she wished the line would move. "I have to get to the Elgin Library to use a computer." I inquired why she didn't use our library to use a computer? She was surprised to learn that we had computers. I was amazed to learn that she had no idea that her property tax dollars bought computers as well as books. I wondered how many others did not know how their tax dollars were spent at the library.

Our library has a budget of just over one million dollars from which salaries, maintenance, utilities, book purchases, office supplies, insurance, legal fees, automation improvements, programs, and other expenses must be paid.

For example: In 1998, we had a huge expense when the HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) system had to be replaced at a cost of \$206,469.60.

New books cost \$113,126.63 while videos, CD's and cassettes cost \$32,469.26.

Automation expansion (computers, software and databases) cost \$26,887.32 with an additional \$410.68 being spent monthly for Internet access.

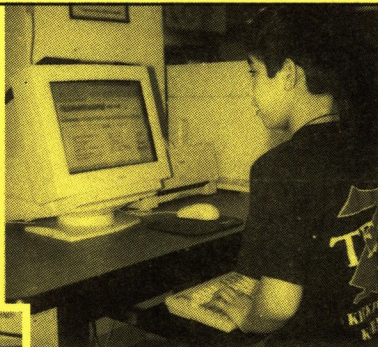
Salaries, insurance, inservice education for the staff and legal fees amounted to \$750,945.00. Utilities were \$52,403.00.

Supplies; office, library, maintenance, new copy machine and machine maintenance were \$28,363.00.

New entrance doors, a new telephone system, and some

new furniture for the Children's Department was purchased. A new outside book drop box was also purchased.

When we took our survey of what patrons wanted, one of the items was more programs, both adult and childrens. More programs were added at the cost of \$7,156.52.



In the aforementioned survey, the most requested item was improved parking. This spring work will begin on the parking lot. We will increase parking spaces to 94, install new lighting, widen the entrance, and repair the existing parking area. The cost for this project will be \$60,000 to \$80,000.

Future plans include remodeling the interior of the library to provide more space for books, improvement of restrooms, signage and landscape work, and also Local Area

Networking of the computers.

There is no way that we can compete with the larger libraries in our North Suburban area. Some have budgets six times larger than ours, but with good budgeting by our Director, we are up-to-date on a smaller scale.

Please use your library. After all, you are paying for it.

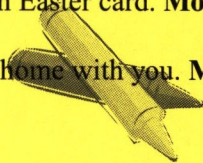
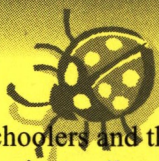
MAKE AND TAKE CRAFT PROGRAMS

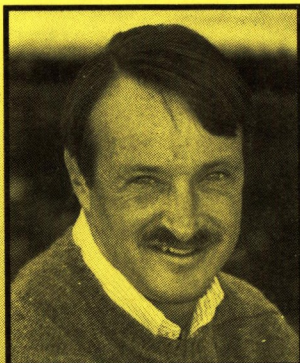
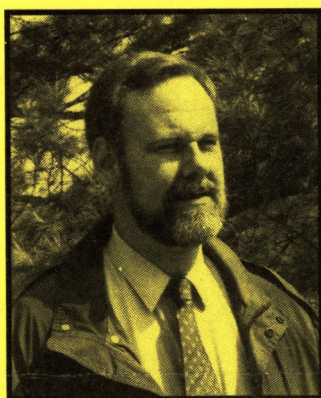

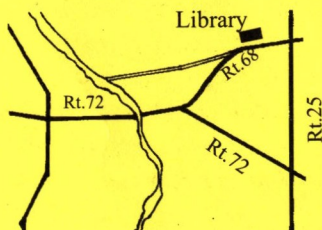
