LOCAL EDUCATION AND LIBRARY SUPPORTER VISITS CONGRESS

Patricia Ostewig was among seventy-eight Illinois residents who attended the 25th Library Legislative Day held May 3-4 and urged Capitol Hill legislators to support library and educational issues.

The group representing Illinois met with members of the Illinois Congressional delegation to seek sponsorship for library and educational legislation in Congress. Ms. Ostewig met with Illinois Senators Richard Durbin and Peter Fitzgerald as well as House Speaker Dennis Hastert's staff. Ms. Ostewig is the Vice President of the Dundee Township Library Board of Trustees, a member of the North Suburban Library System Board of Directors and Art Department Chair at Dundee-Crown High School.

The Legislative Day was sponsored by the American Library Association and other concerned organizations in an effort to raise awareness about the importance of federal funding. Members of Congress were urged to

advocate programs such as E-rate discounts on telecommunications for library service and the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act with funds earmarked for libraries.

"Libraries and schools need continued federal support for changing technology if we are to keep pace with the rapid growth in library use," Ms. Ostewig said.

"Although our libraries receive much of its funding from state and local funds, federal assistance stimulates local dollars and helps stretch them further."

Ms. Ostewig is also a member of the American Library Association and the Illinois Library Association. Her trip was made possible by a scholarship from the North Suburban Library Association and additional assistance from the Dundee Township Public Library District and

from Dundee-Crown High School. The American Library Association members include 57,000 libraries, trustees, friends of the libraries, and others interested in improving public and school libraries. As in previous years, Illinois had the largest delegation for this Congressional visit and encouraged legislators to give their support to libraries.

CUBA by Stephen Coonts. The U.S. is threatened by six ballistic missiles Castro and the Russians secretly stashed after the Cuban missile crisis.





FALL STORYTIME





HARVEST HOME


