Library nurtures love of reading in children

There is one place in the Dundee Township Library where quiet is not the rule.

In fact, noise is often expected in the children's department.

Besides the story hours, the library offers many activities that both kids and their parents can participate in. And the programs are free.

Reading Club is the Winter Reading Club. This program is less stringent, but still keeps the children involved with the library during the school year.

Special events are also featured, such as short-story contests and guest appearances.

There are also two book clubs.

One of these is the Read-to-Me Club, which is geared toward preschoolers and first-graders.

In this program the child receives a free picture paperback when his parent reads the required number of books to him.

The other club is called PACT, or Parents and Children Together.

The guidelines for this club consist of the parent and child reading 10 books, each more than 80 pages, to-

gether.

Again, when this is completed, the child receives a free paperback.

Preschoolers are a big part of the programs that are developed.

Besides daytime and evening story hours, there are also times set aside for movies.

These programs, as well as others, keep the children quite active.

Wagner said getting a child involved in the program at an early age pays dividends throughout their school career.

"The children get to be our buddies," she said. "When they're working on a book report of some other kind of homework, they're not afraid to come up to us and ask questions."
