# C'ville board cites Cargill Says smokestack violates zoning

CARPENTERSVILLE - Citations charging zoning code violations for building a 100-foot smokestack have been sent to Cargill Inc., Carpentersville Village Manager Curtis Carver reported Tuesday.

Cargill was cited with violating three sections of the village zoning and building codes by erecting a tall chimney on a liquid waste incinerator at the company's Cottage Avenue resins manufacturing

plant, Carver said.

The village citations follow a recent decision from the Second District Appellate Court in Elgin that overrode a year-old ruling against the village by the Illinois Pollution Control Board. The IPCB had ruled that because Cargill had a permit from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, which required construction of the stack, that permit superceded local ordinances which limited the height of the stack.

The appellate court also sent the case back to the IPCB to consider if the tall stack is necessary for the incinerator. The pollution control board had not considered that issue at its hearings.

Cargill reportedly has filed a

notice of intent to appeal the ruling of the appellate court. That notice gives the company the option of later taking its case to the Illinois Supreme Court, Carver said today.

One citation the village issued against Cargill charges the company with violating the village zoning code's 35-foot limit on structure heights. The other two citations claim violations of similar sections in building and zoning codes which require obtaining a village building permit before construction begins, Carver said after Tuesday's village board meeting.

He said the citations were sent Dec. 13. Cargill has until Friday "to abate" the problem before the village takes further action. Should the deadline pass without a response from Cargill, the village's next action would probably be a second notice, Carver said.

The 100-foot stack was built last summer without village permission. The smokestack was one of the conditions of a permit from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to resume operating a liquid waste incinerator. The incinerator, which originally had a shorter chimney, had been shut

WOODSTOCK - A nearly 6year-old battle over what should be McHenry County's role in providing aid to needy veterans ended Tuesday when county board members approved establishment of a local veterans assistance commission.

The 17-5 vote to create the commission followed an often acrimonious hour-long debate.

Commission opponents, some of whom charged that they were being unfairly labeled as anti-vet-

eran, said the commission is unnecessary and would just become another bureaucuracy siphoning off money that should be going directly to indigent veterans and their families.

But others said the commission would provide needed services not being met under the present veterans aid system. They also said McHenry County is the only county in the state that has balked at establishment of a veterans assistance commission after local veterans groups requested

The idea of a VAC has been discussed in the county since at least early 1983.

Commission opponents have insisted all along that any veteran who needs assistance under the state's Bogardus Act can get it through both county officials and the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs. The act was passed in 1907 to provide relief to indigent veterans and their families.

Richard Meyers of Prairie Grove, who chairs the county board's legislative and public affairs committee which has been

Village trustees had refused to grant Cargill a variance from the zoning code's height restriction.

In other business, the board:

 Accepted financial audit reports as of last April 30, from Mueller and Co., which show the village had assets of approximately \$20 million and equity of \$18 million. Total debt for the fiscal year ending April 30, was \$630,000 according to the report.


 Approved a preliminary plan for the proposed Newport Coves subdivison to be built on 55 acres at Huntley Road, west of Elm Avenue. Approval is contingent to the board's accepting amendments to the property's annexation agreement. The approval is for the preliminary plan only, and

will allow the developer to prepare a final plat and final engineering plans.

 Approved the final plat for the Hill subdivision on Huntley Road in West Dundee. Carpentersville approval was required because the development has access to Huntley Road through Carpentersville.

 Accepted an agreement from Baxter & Woodman, Inc., for a design study to improve lift station 13 which serves sewer users in eastern Carpentersville. The fee, not to exceed \$6,000, will be based on time and materials.

 Accepted a bid from Friedman, Eisenstein, Raemer & Schwartz of Chicgo to provide insurance consulting services for \$3,030 plus expenses. Use of a consultant to find a new insurance carrier was criticized by Trustee Russel Morehead who felt the village could do that on its own.
